Early British and American Packet Service from Liberia to America

Liberia did not have a Post Office until late 1854. Effective April 1, 1858, Liberia had an agreement with the British General Post Office (GPO) to transport Liberian mail through the UK with a requirement for prepayment of all mail. Prepayment was unusual for West Africa at that time (Sacher, 2010).

As of April 1, 1858, the contracted $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce rate to America was set at 33¢, consisting of:

- 8¢ transport to the UK (4d Sterling),
- 2¢ UK transit (1d Sterling),
- 16¢ Atlantic crossing (8d Sterling),
- 5¢ USA local rate and
- 2¢ to Liberia.

Only two covers have been reported dated after April 1, 1858 but prior to the introduction of Liberian postage stamps in January 1860, utilizing these rates. The first stamped cover from Liberia is dated January, 1860.

Prior to April 1, 1858, letters sent to America were normally either hand carried or sent on merchant ships and cancelled "SHIP" when arriving in America. The Captain of the vessel received 2ϕ for the delivery of each letter. If the address on the letter was the "Port of Entry" the letters were charged 6ϕ due, otherwise the appropriate local rate plus a 2ϕ ship rate was charged as the rate due.

Of course, some letters after April 1, 1858 were still sent via merchant ship (with postage due in America), and some letters sent after January, 1860 via the British Packet system were without stamps but were still prepaid (Sacher 2010).

Beginning in September, 1852, the British GPO had a contract with the African Steamship Company to carry mail as far as Fernando Po (Sacher, 2010). Fernando Po was located east of Liberia, off the coast of what is now known as Cameroon. The following two covers were

picked up by British vessels and sent through the British Packet Mail system prior to April 1, 1858, but after September, 1852. Only three covers are known during this timeframe utilizing the British Packet Mail system.

The first cover shown was sent from "Lower Buchanan, Grand Bassa County" by Simon Harrison to Walter Lowrie, of New York, who discusses his trip to Liberia with his family, the desire to have a church, and his awkwardness of trying to "fit-in".

It illustrates on the front:

- "<u>NEW YORK Br. PKT SEP 23</u>" and "<u>65</u>" in black from the USA.
- <u>"60 Cts</u>" (mns) due to the UK.

On the reverse:

- "<u>PLYMOUTH PACKET LETTER SP 9 1853 B</u>" in faded red.
- "LIVERPOOL SP 10 1853 A10" in blue,
- An oval Liverpool "SP 10" datestamp in black, and
- A black straightline UK "<u>ART-2</u>" handstamp.

The British GPO $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. rate from West Africa to America in 1853 was 65ϕ :

- 24¢ (1 shilling) to the UK,
- 36¢ Atlantic crossing and
- 5¢ US local rate.

Liberia did not have a Post Office, so nothing was due to Liberia.

Cover 1 is the earliest Liberian use of the British Packet Mail service. It is the first of three known covers with UK postal markings prior to April 1, 1858.

The second cover is dated February 6, 1854, from Monrovia and was written by Armistead Miller to Walter

Lowrie. The contents discuss his father's recent death and necessary financial arrangements needed to receive funds in Monrovia. Unlike the previous cover, this letter was sent to the UK via the British Packet system, but progressed to America via the American Packet system.

The front illustrates:

- "NEW YORK Am. PKT MAR 24" in black and "45" (mns) from the USA.
- "<u>24</u>" (mns) due to the UK (written over "Lowrie").

On the reverse:

- "<u>PLYMOUTH PACKET LETTER MR 3 xxxx</u>" in faded red.
- London GPO "<u>BZ 4 MR 1854</u>" in red.

At some point between late 1853 to January, 1854 the Atlantic crossing rates changed. The rate from West Africa to America was now 45ϕ :

- 24¢ (1 shilling) to the UK,
- 16¢ Atlantic crossing and a
- 5¢ US local rate.

Liberia did not have a Post Office, so nothing was due to Liberia.

This 1854 Atlantic rate is now consistent with the Atlantic rate as of April 1, 1858. The charge from West Africa through the UK was later reduced to 11ϕ on April 1, 1858, and along with 2ϕ due to Liberia made 33ϕ total charge to America.

This is the earliest Liberian use of the <u>American</u> Packet Mail service. There is a sister cover to this that was sent on the same ship.

These two covers are both from the Barbara Ray Fosdyke collection.

Australia Study Group Met February 3rd

Ten members of the Australia Study Group met on Saturday morning, February 3 to share their progress in just our second year of each starting new collections in this common area.

Attendees were Rich Bajenski, Ron Strawser, Bryant Korn, John Germann, Ardie Callender, David Willig, Mort Levy, Larry Ballantyne and Jay and Denise Stotts.

The group discussed several ways to expand awareness of the group among the HPS and philately. One subject was to create a presence on the HPS web site.

Another idea that was proposed was to create a single frame exhibit to be put in a frame at the Greater Houston Show to promote the collecting areas of the various members. This exhibit would differ slightly from the one entered in the club team competition at Texpex 2017.

For Texpex 2017, individuals created single page "stories" explaining a single item or set. For GHSS, the exhibits, some of them two page spreads, will be more geared to explain specific collecting areas which members are focusing on. A sign-up sheet was passed around and members committed to complete a page or two. With a title page, the members committed to 16 pages. Rich will create a title page. The table shows member commitments.

Three members' collections were featured and passed around the group:

Ron Strawser is focusing on the Australian stamps that were overprinted for the North West Pacific Islands. During World War I, the Australian Forces captured German holdings in the Pacific, and these became the "N.W. Pacific Islands". Overprinted Australian stamps were used by the inhabitants between 1915 and 1923. Ron showed singles and multiples of stamps and is currently looking for postal history as well.

Mort Levy is collecting the Tasmania pictorial issue of 1899-1900. Mort intends to collect the various listed watermark and perforation varieties. He also is forming a collection of the 1d Mt. Wellington stamps with socked-on-the-nose town cancels he has a list that he obtained from the internet that has about 450 towns listed.
