Misplaced Australia "B.C.O.F JAPAN 1946" overprints on the 6d and 1/- Stamps

The Australian "B.C.O.F JAPAN 1946" (British Commonwealth Occupation Forces) overprints were made by the Australian Army to control that stamps were only used in Japan, and not brought back to Australia and exchanged for cash. The British Commonwealth Occupation Forces included troops from the UK, New Zealand and India, but the postal services were administered by Australia.

The BCOF overprints were printed on seven values from 1/2d to 5 Shillings. There are a number of typeset varieties on all values. Only the 1/- stamp is recorded as having a "misplaced overprint", which consists of a 4mm shift of the overprint to the right.

Following is an un-reported example of the 6d Kookaburra with a 4mm shift to the left! Also

shown below is a philatelic cover with the complete set of seven values, with another example of the "shifted Kookaburra".

This cover is interesting in that the 1/- value is also shifted to the left, but only by approximately 2mm, also unrecorded. This cover is unusual in that it is a "Commander in Chief British Commonwealth Forces" cover (to Hong Kong!), and not the usual "Imperial Forces" cover. The cover is cancelled "AUST ARMY PO 214" dated in "JY 46".




Cover featuring a full set of B.C.O.F. stamps including the 6p stamp with a 4mm shift to the left.

Use of the 1938 Australia King George VI 1/4d Stamp

The 1/4d KGVI stamp was issued on 3 October 1938 and had 5 printings ending April 1946. The intended use of this stamp was for the interstate telegram rate.

Above is a triple rate airmail cover from Melbourne to London cancelled on 17-NO-39, utilizing a strip of 3 of the 1/4d stamp and a 6d Kookaburra to make a 4/6d franking. The airmail rate to London was 1/6d per ½ oz.

This cover went via the World War II era "Horseshoe Route" via India, which had replaced the route via Karachi. A relatively early use of the 1/4d stamp and multiples of this stamp are not common on cover.

Folded Letters and 19th Century Filling Systems

Prior to the development of envelopes in the 1840's, most U.S. correspondence was written on folded sheets of paper which are commonly known in philately as "folded letters". The content was typically written on right half of the sheet which was then folded vertically in half (with the correspondence inside).

Next it was folded in thirds with sealing wax used to secure the two flaps together on the reverse. A single sheet of paper was most commonly employed as postal rates were based not only on distance but also on the number of sheets of paper.

Before the introduction of adhesives in 1847, folded letters were sent stampless, either paid or unpaid. With the advent of the 1847 Issues, folded letters could now be sent prepaid. Folded letters were eventually replaced in the 1870's as mass produced envelopes were easier to use, inexpensive and readily available.

Often encountered on folded letters are horizontal or vertical folds that don't correspond to the original folds used in fabricating the letter.




Are these mistakes in original assembly of the letter? If not then, what purpose do these folds serve?

In philatelic literature these folds are known as "file fold lines". These file folds are actually the result of the system regularly used by 19th century businesses to organize their correspondence. Folded letters collected from the post office were opened, read and, if important, refolded lengthwise either in

thirds or quarters.

Usually at the top of the refolded letter reference is made to the sender, date and any other pertinent information. Then appropriate groups (by company, month, type of product, etc.) were banded together with the applicable information at the top.



This system was employed before the first appearance of filing cabinets and each group was probably placed in orderly piles.

Clerks could thumb through the top of each group to reference the appropriate piece of correspondence. At a later date, philatelists refolded the letters into their original design, now with "file fold lines".

As the common practice in the day was to save the correspondence and remove the addressed portion of folded letters, many outer half of the folded letters remain separated from the correspondence portions.

Unfortunately most early post offices did not place year dates within their date stamps so that many outer halves have little year date information.

The placement of information (date and sender information) on the back flap from this early filing system is extremely helpful to present day postal historians in dating folded letters.
