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2020 Greater Houston Stamp Show Update

Last year's Greater Houston Stamp Show, which faced "the Great Flood" was interesting, as in the ancient Chinese curse "May you live in interesting times." As show chairman I had hoped that was about as interesting the show would get. It appears however that the interesting times are still upon us. As you know the COVID-19 virus has affected the stamp hobby in many ways, including HPS meetings. It is also affecting the Greater Houston Stamp Show.

The GHSS Foundation, Inc. board of directors has been, and will continue to monitor the COVID-19 situation and its effects on the show. After studying economic, health and related considerations, the GHSS Foundation, Inc. board voted about two weeks ago to not have exhibits, meetings or the awards dinner at this year's show. This will significantly improve the economics of the show and will reduce the strain on our supply of show volunteers since it will not be necessary to set up and take down the exhibit frames. We are still planning on having the beginner's booth and the concession stand, although both will undergo some changes in their operation. The show bourse will be held in the same hall as past years, possibly with a few less dealers. This combined with the absence of the exhibit frames will allow dealer's booths to be more widely spaced.

The GHSS board will continue to monitor the situation and if necessary make further decisions concerning the show. As it currently stands, the show is still scheduled to occur on September 18-20 at the Humble Civic Center. Additional Notes on the Greater Houston Show

- In early June (before the latest spike in covid cases and the current Texas mandate to wear masks) Jay Stotts conducted a survey of the GHSS dealers. He had communications from 27 dealers. Only one did not respond. Feedback was 23 dealers positively want the show to be held. They were extremely serious about their yes and have been working up material for the show. Of the other four votes, two were no, based on what we know today (early June), and two were wavering.
- Ron and Bethel Strawser sent out almost 200 emails to former show attendees (also before the latest spike in covid cases) asking, based on then-current conditions, if they planned on attending GHSS 2020. 56 replied back with 84% saying yes, 4% maybe and 12% no.

Greater Houston Stamp Show 2020. Humble Civic Center, 8233 Will Clayton Pkwy, Humble, TX. The Board of GHSS Foundation, Inc. has voted to eliminate parts of the show as described in the lead article on page 1. There will be no exhibits, meetings or Awards Banquet this year. Join HPS Weekly Virtual Meetings

Covid-19 has made our regular in-person HPS meetings impossible, but many of us have continued to meet virtually using the Zoom application every Monday at 7:10 p.m. We keep the format informal with a question and answer session, a general discussion of club business and several members providing "mini-presentations".

Recently we have seen presentations on subjects such as Astro Philately, "Dear Doctor" postcards, the Polish Army in Italy, unusual and comical mail, and many more subjects. If you have not joined a meeting in the past you are welcomed and encouraged to join us in the future.

Some members have had concerns about joining a meeting using the Zoom application because of security flaws reported in the media and others because of poor Internet connections at home. Regarding security, the issues that were reported early on regarding the Zoom application were actually the same issues we faced in an in-person meeting. There is a concern that anyone could "crash" a meeting, and for example, display inappropriate materials.

This is a risk we also faced when meeting at the church, anyone could walk in that door. There were other more technical concerns also. However, these issues have since been addressed by Zoom and while we keep our meeting open to the public, a person who wants to join the meeting must have a link to join.

A poor Internet connection is a bit more difficult to address. You do however, have options, if your home Internet speed is below 20 mps. Option one is to join the meeting on your computer but turn off your web cam so that you can see what is happening, but do not waste bandwidth broadcasting video from your computer. Another option is to join with your phone using your data plan to see and send video (assuming you have a smart phone). A third option is to call into the meeting using audio only. This last option will allow you to hear what is going on, but you will not be able to see the presentations.




Rick Barrett lecturing at the CCNY on in October.



An Unusual NYFM Cover to Algeria

During the late nineteenth century, the great majority of transatlantic mail transiting the New York Post Office (NYPO) went to just three major European countries; England, France and Germany. Covers addressed to Eastern Europe, Middle East, China and many African nations are truly scarce. One such cover to Africa is shown below



The cover is addressed to Djidjelii, Algeria, which is a port city located on the Mediterranean in the Jijel Province of eastern Algeria. Sent at the 5¢ UPU rate, the cover is dated 10 December 1877. It is docketed "via France" in the lower left corner, indicating the sender intended the letter to be sent via France. A French entry date stamp (Calais) can be seen weakly struck at the lower left corner. The cover left by train from Calais, arriving at Marseille on 24 December 1877 as indicated by backstamp. After crossing the Mediterranean Sea, it arrived in Djidjelii on 30 December 1877 (backstamp) some 20 days from New York City.

If the destination is not unusual enough, the NY-PO postal process employed is also quite uncommon. During a short period in 1877-78, New York City Postal Sub-Stations were not permitted to cancel foreign mail. However, they had to indicate where the mail piece originated and thus had to strike their date stamp somewhere on the letter.

In some cases, each station's duplex was struck

on the reverse but in this case it was struck on the front of the cover - see the duplexed ellipse from Station E to the right of the adhesives. The adhesives remained un-cancelled but upon receipt downtown, at the foreign section of the NYPO, the stamps were cancelled by two strikes of an eight-rayed star New York Foreign Mail (NYFM) cancel.

The foreign section could not apply their date stamp as the letter had already received a Station E origination date stamp.

Now, fancy geometric NYFM cancels were not normally used by the NYPO during 1877 as foreign mail was being cancelled by a duplexed date stamp/ vertical bar ellipse device; fancy geometrics were discontinued in 1876. So here we have a special circumstance in which fancy geometric NYFM cancels continue in use into 1878.

It's uncommon destination and curious handling process make this a most interesting and appealing NYFM cover.

An Uncommon 19th Century Destination and Mystery – Persia

In a previous article I discussed a NYFM cover sent to Algeria, a somewhat uncommon 19th century destination. In fact, covers sent to usual destinations are a collecting area that I have specialized for numerous years.

One such scarce destination cover is here. Sent from Hartford Connecticut, the cover is dated 31 January 1882 and is addressed to Jas. B. Haliburton, Tehran, Persia.

Having retired from the oil industry, it was hoped that the cover (Haliburton and Persia) might have an oil industry connection – unfortunately not. The cover was sent at the 5¢ UPU rate, franked by a 2¢ and 3¢ 1879 American Bank Note Company adhesives.



It reached Tehran on the 11th of March and after an unbelievable thirty eight days, the addressee was not located. On 17th April (datestamp) the cover was returned to the U.S., receiving the purple pointing finger handstamp towards the bottom. It is unclear where the pointing finger handstamp was applied as a city is not indicated anywhere on the marking. This type of marking was employed by numerous post offices in the U.S.

Here is where the mystery thickens as the next chronologic marking is a Washington, D.C. date-stamp applied on the 23rd of June. Where was the cover for thirty seven days between Tehran and Washington, D.C.? Assuming normal transit times between Tehran and the U.S., the cover should have arrived back in the US sometime around the 23-24th April. It should have received a foreign exchange office transit marking on arrival as Washington D.C. was not a foreign exchange office. Did it arrive in Washington, D.C. to be examined, pointing finger handstamp struck and then sent onto Hartford? After Washington D.C., the cover was sent onto Harford as indicated by the Hartford receiving datestamp dated 24th June 1882 (on the reverse).

The cover spent another 28 days in Hartford before being sent to the Dead Letter Office back in Washington, D.C. (triangular DLO backstamp on reverse). Did no one claim the cover at Bunnell and Scranton a well respected banking and brokerage firm? The covers spent a total of 145 days or almost 5 months in transit before arriving at the DLO.

The banking and investment firm of Bunnell and Scranton was established by Henry H. Bunnell in 1861. In 1882, the company was located at 732 and 734 Chapel Street in Hartford and was a member of the New York Stock Exchange. During early 1891, instead of buying securities as the firm had purported to do, the money was speculated against the money on deposit at the bank and was lost. Sadly, Mr. Bunnell became ill and as reported in the 20 May 1891 New York Times article "the business has worried him greatly and that it hastened his death." After the company closed, Charles W. Scranton, the surviving member of the firm filed a statement of financial condition on 27 May giving the firm's liabilities at \$553,588.36 and assets valued at \$150,000. Investor received less than 25 percent return on their holdings.
